Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory. Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance. GOSPEL

Ps 72:1-2,7-8,10-11 12-13

Matthew 2:1-12 When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saving, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said. "Go and search diligently for the child. 

EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

The solemnity of the Epiphany which celebrates the manifestation of God to humanity began in the Eastern Church in the third century. Called Theophany,

it was primarily a feast of the baptism of the Lord, but it also incorporated themes of his nativity, the visit of the magi, and the marriage feast at Cana.

The church of Rome adopted this celebration in the fourth century and focused it on the adoration of the magi since it already had a feast of the Lord's nativity in place. In the United States, we observe the Epiphany on the Sunday between January 2 and 8, but there are places where it is celebrated as a holy day of obligation on the traditional date of January 6.

Prayer - Epiphany

Let us pray. Father, you revealed your Son to the nations by the guidance of a star. Lead us to your glory in heaven by the light of faith. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Blessing of Our Home

Epiphany is a traditional time to bless homes.

Lord our God, bless this household. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness and love. We give you thanks to you, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen. Blessed are you, Lord, God of heaven and earth, you revealed your Son Jesus to every nation by the light of a star. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may radiate the light of Christ who is our Lord and Savior. Amen.

A Second Nativity Feast

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory. Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance.

Isaiah 60:1ff.

The Greek word epiphaneia denotes an "appearance" or "manifestation." In religious discourse it was used as a technical term for the visible manifestation—either by a personal appearance or powerful deed— of a deity previously hidden from human sight. The history of the Christian feast in the East, that derives its name from this word, reveals the scriptural images of the birth and baptism of Jesus as the Epiphany proclamation that God has made a visible appearance in human history.

In the West, where December 25 is adopted as the nativity festival, the content of Epiphany is redrawn as the feast of the visit of the Magi, the baptism at the Jordan and the miracle at Cana.



Reflection- "The Work of Christmas"

Today's feast of the Epiphany stretches out the Christmas celebration, not to prolong the telling of the story, but to expand on the implications of the mystery of Christmas. It is up to us to echo the glory song of the angels in the real life situations in which we live—to raise our voice in simple, direct affirmation of the values of life together, love enfleshed in our families, peace in our troubled world, and in gentle rebuke when life and love are attacked. No, Christmas is not a one-day or even a twelve-day celebration. The dawn follows the silent night to remind us that every day and age and each person needs to experience Christ's redemption.







On this Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, we remember that God came to earth for everyone, every nation, every people.




AMERICAN SAINTS



ELIZABETH ANN SETON • JANUARY 4

Mother Seton is one of the keystones of the American Catholic Church. She founded the first American religious community for women, the Sisters of Charity. She opened the first American parish school and established the first American Catholic orphanage. All this she did in the span of 46 years while raising her five children.

Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seton is a true daughter of the American Revolution, born August 28, 1774, just two years before the Declaration of Independence. By birth and marriage, she was linked to the first families of New York and enjoyed the fruits of high society. Reared a staunch Episcopalian by her mother and stepmother, she was a convert to Roman Catholicism. EAS was a wife, mother, widow, sole parent, foundress, educator, social minister, and spiritual leader. Elizabeth Bayley Seton was the first person born in the United States to become a canonized saint (September 14, 1975.



JOHN NEUMANN • JANUARY 5

In March 1852 Neumann was consecrated in Baltimore, as Bishop of Philadelphia. He was the first bishop in the United States to organize a Catholic diocesan school system, and he increased the number of Catholic schools in his diocese from one to one hundred. His construction campaign extended to parishes churches as well. He actively invited religious orders to establish new houses within the diocese and founded a congregation of the third order Franciscan sisters, the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis of Philadelphia. He brought the School Sisters of Notre Dame to the New World. He established and built so many new parish churches within the diocese that one was completed almost at the rate of one every month.

Neumann's efforts to expand the church throughout his diocese was not without oppostion. The Know Nothings, an anti-Catholic political party, was at the height of its activities, setting fire to convents and schools. While running errands on January 5, 1860, Neumann collapsed and died on a city street in Philadelphia due to a stroke. He was 48 years old. Neumann was beatified by Pope Paul VI during the Second Vatican Council on 13 October 1963. He was canonized by Paul VI on 19 June 2004. Following his canonization, the National Shrine of Saint John Neumann was constructed at the Parish of St. Peter the Apostle in Philadelphia. The remains of St. John Neumann rest under the main altar of the shrine within a glass-walled reliquary.

January is Poverty Awareness Month!

Poverty does not strike all demographics equally. For example, in 2018, 10.6% of men, and 12.9% of women lived in Poverty USA. Along the same lines, the poverty rate for married couples in 2018 was only 4.7% - but the poverty rate for single-parent families with no wife present was 12.7%, and for single-parent families with no husband present was 24.9%.

In 2018, the poverty rate for people living with a disability was 25.7%. That's nearly 4 million people living with a disability—in poverty.

Directions to the Statehouse: DRIVING DIRECTIONS

FROM THE EAST: Take 195 west to Route 29 north (toward Lambertville). Exit right at Memorial Drive. Follow signs for the Capitol Complex and proceed through the light at the end of the ramp. After the light, make a sharp first right and proceed making a semi-circle around the parking area. Pass through the light into the Capitol Complex.

FROM THE SOUTH: Take Route 206 north or 295 north and follow directions to 195 west to Route 29 north (toward Lambertville). Follow directions above for traveling from the east.

FROM THE WEST: Enter Trenton via Delaware River toll bridge (Route 1 north). Exit at Route 29. Take Route 29 north (toward Lambertville). Exit right at Memorial Drive. Follow signs for the Capitol Complex and proceed through the light at the end of the ramp. After the light, make a sharp first right and proceed making a semi-circle around the parking area. Pass through the light into the Capitol Complex.

FROM THE NORTH: Take Route 1 south to the last New Jersey exit ("Capitol Complex"). Turn right onto Warren Street and go to the light where you will make a left onto Market Street. Pass through the next light at William Trent Place and bear right following signs for the Capitol Complex.

PARKING: Metered, on-street parking is available along West State Street. Pay lots are located at the corner of South Warren and Lafayette Streets, and at North Warren and Hanover Streets. Handicap parking is available in the parking garage and on West State Street in front of the State House and Annex and across the street from the State House. Paid parking is also available at Trenton Marriot, One West Lafayette Street, Trenton.

FROM THE TRAIN STATION

Walking: South Clinton Avenue runs along the left side of the train station. Proceed up the avenue (to your right when facing the road) one block and make a left onto East State Street. (You'll soon pass the Department of Environmental Protection on your left.) At one point, the street becomes a pedestrian mall. After the mall, the street becomes West State Street. The State House is two blocks up on the left. The walk takes 10-15 minutes.

Cabs: Cabs are available at the rear of the train station.

Buses: Buses stop in front of the train station at the corner of South Clinton Avenue. Most service West State Street and the State House.


