Stewardship Reflection for the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time — July 8/9:

One of the most well known and beloved passages in scripture is the gentle invitation of our Lord in today’s Gospel reading: “Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest.” When we need physical rest, we sleep or take a nap. When we need emotional rest, we sometimes take a vacation. But how do we find spiritual rest? How do we discover Christ’s peace as we grapple with the complex issues of life deep in our hearts? Good stewards find their rest in the Lord. Reflect this week on what you do to welcome the peace of Christ into your heart.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN AND SUMMER CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Thank you to all parishioners who have generously made a pledge and/or gift to the parish capital campaign titled “Moving Forward in Faith.” To date, we have received pledges of \$4,926,302 and funds received totaling \$3,724,871. We are most grateful for your support! Funding from the capital campaign is to help us address needs outside our normal operating revenues (which are funded primarily by the offertory collection).

Three areas to be addressed with funds from the campaign include; physical plant (renovation, restoration and growth), ministry (particular focus on teens); and reserve funds for the future. Pledge forms and packets can be found in the vestibule of the church.

During the summer months, several of the outlined capital campaign projects will begin or be completed. Some of the projects will require us to make adjustments to locations for our Mass services. **Beginning on Monday, July 10th the church will be closed for approximately three weeks.** During the church closure all of the carpet in the main body of the church will be replaced with wood flooring in keeping with our beautiful Georgian Colonial church. All of the pews in the church will be restored and repaired as needed. During the church closure, Daily Mass (Mon– Sat) will take place in Ryan Hall, Sunday Mass schedule will take place as follows: **Saturday:** 5:30pm (School Gym), **Sunday:** 7:30am (Ryan Hall), 9:00am (School Gym) and 11:00am (School Gym). Entrance for Masses in the gym will be at the main school entrance. We will have portable air-conditioning available in the Gym for the comfort of parishioners.

The trellis in the gathering space will be removed in the next few weeks. There are several reasons for this change, namely the trellis is in disrepair due to damage caused by the large vines bursting wood supports and an infestation of carpenter bees. The gathering space will be reconfigured to maximize use for parish events.

Stewardship of Treasure Update

Over the last three years, the parish has faced a decline of \$300,000 in our offertory collections from \$1.5M in 2014 to approximately \$1.2M in 2017. At the same time, increasing costs, primarily benefits and archdiocesan assessments, has resulted in ongoing operating budget deficits. Like your own households, the parish cannot sustain these ongoing deficits long-term.

Given the financial challenges, I have worked with the parish staff, finance council and stewardship councils to contain costs as we have faced these declining revenues. As we prepared the 2018 budget, which took effect on July 1st, we had to make difficult choices to reduce our expenses. As we considered how to close our \$300,000 budget deficit we tried to make cuts that we hope will least impact parishioners services, but you will notice some changes. Specifically, we made painful cuts of over 22% to salaries and benefits. These cuts will impact our ministries as there are fewer employees and many of those that remain have faced reductions in their hours. I am most grateful to the staff for their support and personal sacrifice for the benefit of the parish as a whole.

We also have reduced various programmatic expenses such as operating supplies, and examined other ways to increase revenue and reduce costs. For example, for the parish bulletin we are increasing advertising revenues and changing the format of the bulletin which will result in nearly \$10,000 cost savings. We will also be reducing some services such as eliminating music at the 7:30am Mass and extra instrumentation during Advent and Lent. When revenue stabilizes and returns to its normal trend, we look forward to restoring these activities again.

I am pleased to report that with these cuts, albeit difficult, we have successfully closed our budget deficit and forecast a balanced budget for the coming year. I thank you for your continued support of the parish.

OUR SUNDAY OBLIGATION



“Much obliged” is an old fashioned phrase first noted in the Old Oxford English Dictionary in the sixteenth century. Over the centuries, the phrase has lost some of its richness. Originally, it meant to be bound to a person by ties of gratitude. Today, the phrase is more often used as an automatic response to someone who has performed a perfunctory service. Unfortunately, this practice does not convey the sense of truly being bound to each other by gratitude. What a loss! Because of that loss, many people understand the word *obligation* as a burden rather than a commitment and duty that flows from a relationship. Obligation is a form of indebtedness that comes from within the heart of a relationship.

Think of the obligations that make for a rich family life. A parent does not say, “I wonder if I have to feed my children this week?” Husbands and wives carry out a myriad of obligatory tasks in service to each other during the course of a week and never ask, “Do I have to?” In loving relationships, we are grateful for the gift of each other and we express that gratitude by doing right actions because we want to do so. Obligatory behaviors grow out of communication, intimacy, and personal and communal relationships. These examples can help us reflect on our “obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation and

rest from servile labor” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, #2041).

The heart of Sunday obligation is gratitude. The word *Eucharist* means “to give thanks.” We gather each week because we are “much obliged” to God — for everything. This obligation is not an automatic response to someone who has performed a perfunctory service. We come together to “give thanks” to God, our Father who is the source of all life and creation, and to Jesus, God’s Son who gave us eternal life through his death on the Cross that is made present in every Mass as we participate again in Christ’s death and Resurrection through the Eucharist.

Each time we “attend Mass,” we bring our lives, our very selves, to the Eucharist. We gather together as a community, grateful to have each other as fellow pilgrims in faith and grateful to be nourished by the body and blood of Christ. Just as the relationships and obligations in families are nurtured and strengthened by intimacy and communion, so too does our participation in the Eucharist nurture and strengthen our relationship with the Trinity. Food nourishes our body in the same way that our participation in Holy Communion nourishes our spirit and unites us together as individuals and as a community in Christ. Acting on our Sunday obligation of being “much obliged” gives us reason to be “more obliged” in the most authentic sense of obligation. Maureen A. Kelly

Christian Stewardship and the Need for Recreation



Is there such a thing as a stewardship of recreation? Some people might dismiss the thought. But they'd be wrong. In his book, *The Gift of the Jews*, author Thomas Cahill observes that, in receiving the Ten Commandments, the ancient Hebrews did something no other ancient society had ever done: they established a day of rest. "The God who made the universe and rested bids us to do the same, calling us to a weekly restoration of prayer, study, and recreation (or re-creation)."

For those of us in the Northern Hemisphere at least, probably no other month bids us to relax as the month of July does. Backyard barbecues, days at the pool or the beach, a recreational outing or simply the lazy idleness of a mid-year Sunday afternoon invite us to slow down. And this invitation should be heeded. Sometimes, our society induces in us a sense of guilt if we're not "doing." But turning off the computer and the phone and spending quality time with those around us, or finding time for our own interior lives, is stewardship of our time which leads to the place where God dwells. It's a good example for our kids as well: July presents a wonderful time to "rest" from all the electronic screens and busyness that dominate their young lives.

July is also the month when U.S. citizens celebrate the proclamation of their freedom. When the Hebrew people first received the Ten Commandments, they too had just received their freedom from the Egyptians after a sojourn in the wilderness. Cahill thinks it's no coincidence that a people recently liberated were in need of a directive to rest and reflect. "Leisure," he writes, "is the necessary ground of creativity, and a free people are free to imitate the creativity of God."


So, the next time you feel guilty about a quiet, reflective time of doing "nothing" remember that recreation also means "re-creation" and that to be a truly creative person, a steward of our interior resources, we must honor our need to rest, relax, be with others, read and play. -*Effie Caldarola*



Saints of the Week

July 14 - St. Kateri Tekakwitha

July 16 - Our Lady of Mt. Carmel



St. Kateri Tekakwitha - (1656 - 1680) was a native American girl born to a Mohawk chief and his Catholic wife. St. Kateri learned about Jesus from her mother and also Jesuit Missionaries. She was badly scarred by a disease that took her family's lives. She stayed with an uncle that objected to her faith. So she fled to a native Catholic village where she helped the sick, did penance for sinners and lived a life of prayer. St. Kateri is the patron saint of Native Americans and the environment.

St. Kateri Tekakwitha, pray for us!

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel - Devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel dates back to the 12th century when hermits founded the Carmelite Order on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land. In 1251, Mother Mary appeared to St. Simon Stock, the leader of the Carmelites in England. She gave him a brown scapular and told him that anyone who wore it in faith would receive divine protection. Our Lady of Mount Carmel's feast day is on 16 July.

Our Lady of Mount Carmel, pray for us!



St Bonaventure joined the order of Franciscans in 1243, and was soon recognized for his intellectual talents. He was sent to study in Paris where he taught and preached for many years. He was a contemporary of St Thomas Aquinas, with whom he defended the mendicant friars against their opponents. In 1257, Bonaventure was elected as the head of the Franciscans, and has since been considered the greatest friar minor since St Francis of Assisi himself. He wrote important works on theology, philosophy and mysticism, and was declared a doctor of the church in 1588. He was also regarded for his compassionate and gentle nature and for his accessibility to those who sought him.






